One of the most popular events in Edinburgh during the Festival is the spectacular Military Tattoo on the Esplanade of Edinburgh Castle, with the floor ramparts providing a fine setting for the display by massed pipes and drums of Scottish regiments. This year's tattoo, which opens on August 18 and will continue until September 9, will include items by the Singapore Military Forces and the Royal Norwegian Guards Band and drill display.
